

In Civic Center WORKS's third year, this workforce development program continued making a profound impact, employing 46 unhoused individuals to contribute to meaningful maintenance and beautification of Civic Center Park. This initiative not only enhanced the park's beauty but also empowered participants with valuable skills and a sense of purpose.

Our continued partnership with Bayaud was instrumental in connecting the WORKS crew to employment opportunities, and we extend our gratitude to Chevron, First Western Trust, Kenneth King Foundation, and VF for their generous support in making this transformative program possible.

In 2024, Civic Center SPARKLES, the Conservancy's volunteer program, expanded significantly to address an increased beautification gap in Civic Center Park. As the City reallocated resources to respond to an unprecedented humanitarian crisis, we remained steadfast in our commitment to maintaining a clean, beautiful, and accessible park. Recognizing that flowers and vibrant landscapes directly impact how welcoming a space feels, we doubled our volunteer efforts, adding an additional volunteer day each week and partnering with the expert team at Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado.

The results were nothing short of remarkable.

Nearly 500 dedicated community members
contributed 1,193 hours of service, maintaining the
park's place as Denver's iconic community hub,
despite challenging circumstances. Additionally,
our ongoing partnership with Grow Local Colorado
led to the harvest of 3,337 pounds of fresh produce
from Civic Center's garden beds, which were shared
with those in need through organizations like Metro
Caring, SAME Café, We Don't Waste, and more.
Together, we not only beautified the park but also
nourished our neighbors, creating a lasting impact
on both the environment and the community.

EATS EMPOWERS COMMUNITY

EATS has provided the best summer lunch in Denver for over a decade, and 2024 did not disappoint. However, Civic Center Conservancy leveraged its unique social impact partnerships model to provide work-based learning for youth, free and clean water for patrons, food vouchers for those in need, and economic supports for emerging small business entrepreneurs — all while maintaining delicious and diverse lunchtime food options for Denverites.

SUPPORTING DIVERSE SMALL BUSINESSES

This year, we embraced our roots with diverse small business entrepreneurs by providing more scholarships and exposure for our vendors than ever before. Our inclusive, dynamic approach resulted in 80% of our EATS vendors identifying as BIPOC, women, or immigrants.

We proudly expanded our scholarship offers to eight women and/or BIPOC-owned food trucks to support regular participation and reduce their financial risk.

YOUTH WORKS FOR EATS

In its second year, the Conservancy's partnership with Youth Employment Academy and Youth on Record proved successful as our Youth WORKS program increased to 34 young people. For our Youth Employment Academy cohort, we provided on-the-job training in event logistics, customer service, and custodial service to increase their opportunities as they entered the workforce. Youth on Record provided Civic Center EATS with entertainment as they engaged youth in learning how to book, produce, and perform in public spaces. Support from Bank of America was paramount in the Conservancy's advocacy for Denver communities through our youth workforce programs.

SUSTAINABILITY

Civic Center Conservancy continued its sustainability efforts to ensure a healthy park for a healthy community. As our Sustainability Partner, Delta Dental of Colorado supported our 3-stream waste disposal system and the addition of the Conservancy's own water tree so that all visitors had access to free water. We provided volunteers and our Youth WORKS crews with knowledge to assist the public with their disposal options. The water tree provided 132 hours of access to clean, free water.

Our beloved July 3rd tradition was reimagined last year as Indy Eve, presented by the City and County of Denver. For the first time, we delivered a drone show, which was the largest drone show in Colorado at the time. Additionally, there were light shows, music by Colorado Symphony Ensemble, and a taste of our new concept NIGHT MARKET with over 50 food and retail vendors. Over 12,000 visitors made their way to the park to enjoy this one-of-a-kind celebration of community and country.







The Conservancy partnered with AEG to present six concerts in the park over the summer, which provided invaluable support to reinvest in our community-centered programming and brought unforgettable entertainment to the park.



The Conservancy was thrilled to welcome nearly 8,000 people to Civic Center Park to celebrate Día de los Muertos, presented by the Denver Botanic Gardens. The 2024 vibrant event was curated by artist Cal Duran, which brought creative floats, mariachi bands, folkloricos, artists, catrinas, altars, and lowriders to honor this day of the dead in Civic Center Park.

NEW PROGRAMS FOR CIVIC CENTER

Civic Center Conservancy launched two successful programs in 2024, STARGAZE and NIGHT MARKET. Both accomplished impactful experiences in the park after dark.





Civic Center Conservancy partnered with AstroTours to bring a celestial journey right in the heart of the city. Skilled astronomers taught visitors of all ages about the wonders of the cosmos, constellations, and their folklore while observing the moon and other celestial bodies through high-powered telescopes. Each STARGAZE provided an "out-of-this-world" experience.





Civic Center's NIGHT MARKET provided a family-friendly evening of local culinary experiences, cultural performances and activities, and a place to connect community in the heart of the city. Produced by Bonfire Event Co., NIGHT MARKET provided a safe and entertaining experience in the park with a Family Fun Zone, diverse music, plus over 25 vendors and merchants in local art, food, and beverages.

HOLIDAYS IN CIVIC CENTER

Civic Center Conservancy was thrilled that both the Christkindlmarket and the Mile High Tree returned to Civic Center Park for their fourth year.

Christkindlmarket, produced by the German American Chamber of Commerce, has been in Denver for 24 years, the last four of which have been in Civic Center Park. This annual event brings authentic German and European holiday traditions to Denver, allowing guests to experience Glühwein, Bavarian-style beers, European coffee, or hot chocolate while wandering through the market full of charming artisans.

The Mile High Tree, offered by Visit Denver, is a seven-story, 110-foot-tall immersive art piece containing 60,000 LED lights. The tree features nightly free public shows choreographed to multicultural holiday music and accommodating up to 140 guests at a time for an immersive viewing experience within the tree.

These two activations, paired with the Conservancy's Great Lawn Lights and the City & County Building Lights, made Civic Center Park Denver's home for the holidays!

COMMUNITY ACTIVATION COLLABORATIVE

Following our community town hall in 2023, we created the Community Activation Collaborative to help us ensure the park reflects the people who live in our city. This group of 14 individuals representing diverse cultural sectors met every other month to provide critical feedback and thought partnerships to create more access to the park for historically marginalized groups. Great results for the group were bringing back Día de los Muertos and launching NIGHT MARKET.

NEXT 100 CAPITAL UPDATE

The Civic Center Next 100 Project gained momentum as designs for the Greek Theater and Central Promenade progressed. World-renowned architectural firm Studio Gang, led by Jeanne Gang, revealed initial 30% design renderings to enhance the Greek Theater and Central Promenade, creating a welcoming, accessible cultural hub for Denver.

As an independent nonprofit, Civic Center Conservancy plays a crucial role in stakeholder engagement by connecting with individuals, businesses, and community groups, as well as funding the design phase and fundraising for future construction phases. As this project continues to move forward, here are all your questions answered.

WHAT EXACTLY IS THE CIVIC CENTER NEXT 100 PROJECT?

The Civic Center Next 100 project aims to revitalize Denver's Civic Center through four integrated projects: modernizing the Greek Theater into a premier outdoor venue, upgrading the Central Promenade to accommodate year-round events, transforming Bannock Street into a vibrant public plaza, and creating a new Central Gathering Feature with public art and gardens.

HOW IS THE PROJECT FUNDED?

The Phase 1 design and construction budget currently totals \$18 million, funded through multiple sources: \$4 million from the Elevate Denver Bond, \$290,000 from the Civic Center Conservancy, \$1.8 million from the Mellon Foundation, with Denver Parks & Recreation providing the remaining funds. Civic Center Conservancy is working toward bringing additional private funds to the table.

WHEN WILL THE CIVIC CENTER NEXT 100 IMPLEMENTATION PROJECT BREAK GROUND? WILL EVENTS TAKE PLACE IN THE PARK WHILE UNDER CONSTRUCTION?

Construction is anticipated to begin in fall 2025. While the central portion of the park, including the Central Promenade and the Greek Theater area of the park, will be closed during construction, other portions of the park, including the Broadway Terrace and area around the Voorhies Memorial, will remain open.







HOW DOES THE DESIGN RESPECT AND ENHANCE CIVIC CENTER PARK AS DENVER'S FIRST NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK?

The design of this revitalization project was carefully crafted with input from historic preservation experts. Drawing direct inspiration from Edward Bennett's 1918 plan, the new Central Promenade design re-establishes his original pattern of a central walk flanked by two smaller paths, now complemented by arched pathways. The project will create accessible routes that follow historic patterns while providing universal access to key features, including the Voorhies Memorial and Greek Theater.

The Greek Theater rehabilitation will feature a design that preserves the original structure while introducing a new canopy and reoriented bowl design. These improvements maintain the theater's historic character while ensuring accessibility to all levels and features.

WILL THE PROPOSED DESIGN IN THE GREEK THEATER ADDRESS ACCESSIBILITY CONCERNS?

A main goal of the project is to increase access. The new design will make the Greek Theater accessible for the first time in its history and provide ADA access wherever possible by removing stairs and other barriers to allow all users the same access within the park.

WHY IS THIS PROJECT IMPORTANT FOR THE FUTURE OF DENVER AND CREATING A MORE VIBRANT DOWNTOWN?

While Civic Center Park excels at hosting the city's largest gatherings, it remains underutilized for daily activities. These improvements will transform the park into a vibrant everyday destination, drawing more visitors and residents year-round while enhancing downtown's economic vitality.



COCKTAILS IN THE PARK

Cocktails in the Park returned in Civic Center for a beautiful night celebrating the year's accomplishments and gearing up for all the transformations to come. This special night for our most committed supporters included talks from Mayor Mike Johnston, our board chair Chris Frampton, our Executive Director Eric Lazzari, and our keynote speaker from our Next 100 architect, Jeanne Gang.




